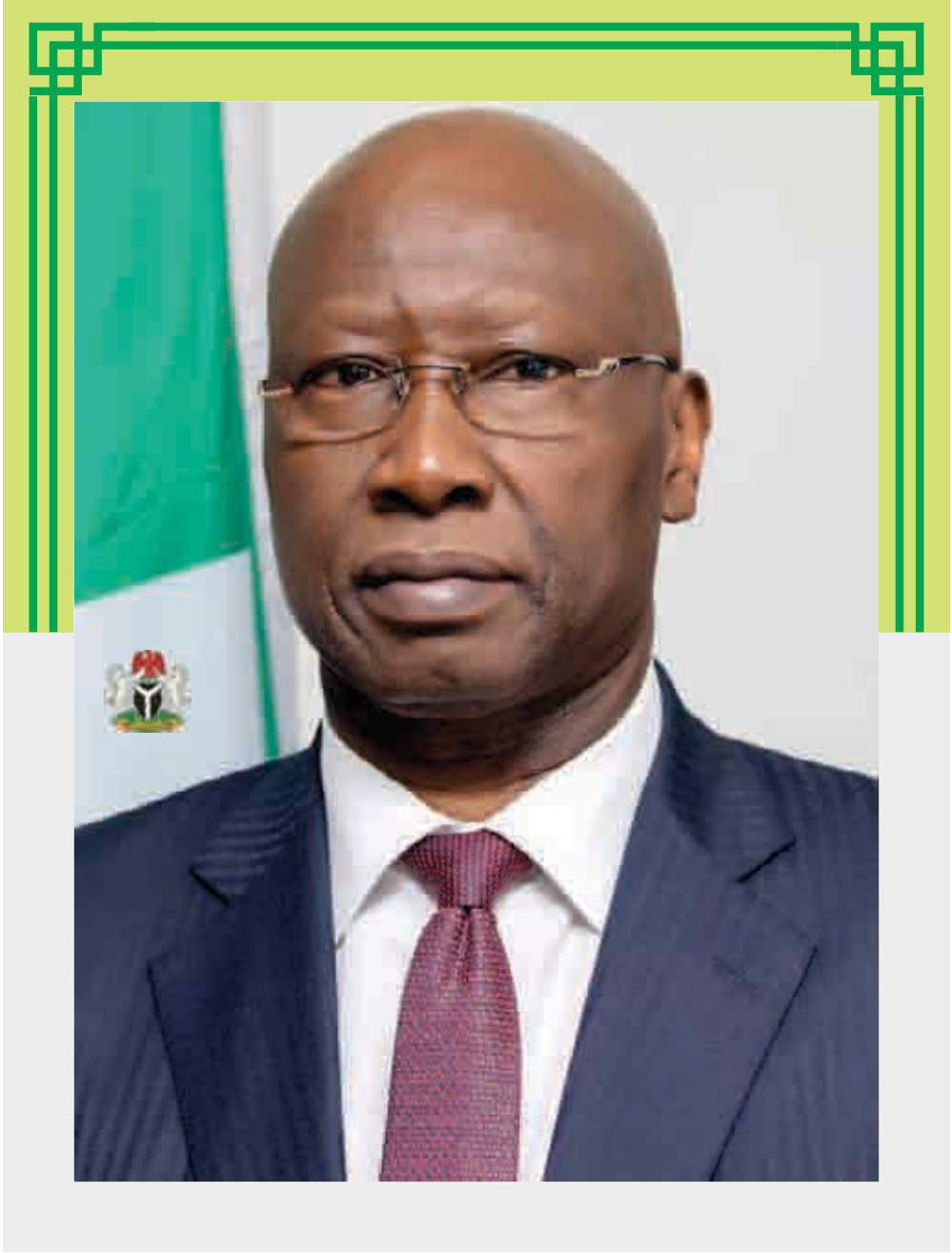

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In the year 2020, the Bureau, just like other organisations, witnessed the effect of the Covid -19 pandemic in fulfilling its mandate. Notwithstanding, the Bureau was able to carry out some activities using technological tools in achieving its mandates.

The Bureau in the bid to carry out its activities within and to other Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), issued a Covid – 19 Procurement Guidelines that assisted in carrying out its activities. Please check the Bureau's website on www.bpp.gov.ng for the guidelines.

Under the year, some of the following activities took place. One Hundred and Forty-Four (144) number of complaints were recorded, out of which One Hundred and Thirty-Eight (138) were treated and closed while Six (6) were on-going as at the end of year 2020.

It will also be noted that, as at December 2020, Three Hundred and Fifty-Six Certificates of 'No Objection' were given to MDAs.



In the area of capacity building, the Bureau carried out various trainings covering the procurement process in line with the Public Procurement Act, 2007 and other related Laws, Executive Orders, Extant Circulars and related guidelines.

One of such was the Annual Procurement Retreat for Federal Permanent Secretaries, Accountant-General of the Federation and Auditor-General of the Federation held in conjunction with the Office of the Head of Civil Service of the Federation held in strict

adherence to Covid-19 protocols from Thursday, February 6-9, 2020 at Kano State. Other trainings held included Year 2020 Conversion/Induction Training Course for Public Officers into the Procurement Cadre and Interactive workshop with Procurement Officers in the Directorate Cadre.

The Bureau held Stakeholders meetings with Professional Associations and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) in the areas of review of Standard Bidding Documents, e-procurement and such likes.

In conclusion, the Bureau is grateful to the Federal Government who provided needed

resources to be able to carry out the aforementioned activities.

I hope that, the information contained in the report will be able to enlighten and inform our various stakeholders to carry out activities and to provide us with constructive suggestions to enable us improve in carrying out our various functions in relations to procurement in Nigeria.

Background

The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) is one of the best thing that ever happened to Nigeria. In the face of dwindling economic resources and the need to change the status quo with regards to the way the economic activities was handled in the public sector before now, it became an urgent necessity in Nigeria to reform the Public Procurement system following a World Bank Country Procurement Assessment survey conducted in 1999, which revealed weaknesses in procedures fostering widespread corruption. These were having negative consequences on national development, especially in the area of infrastructural development in Nigeria. The Assessment Report revealed that 60k was being lost to underhand practices out of every N1.00 spent by Government. Indeed, an average of ten Billion US Dollars (\$10b) was being lost annually due to fraudulent practices in the award and execution of public contracts through inflation of contract cost, lack of procurement plans, poor project prioritization, poor budgeting processes, lack of competition and value for money and other kinds of manipulations of the procurement and contract award processes.

In order to address the above shortcomings, the Federal Government initiated the Public

Procurement Reform as part of its Economic Reform Agenda designed to restore due process in the award and execution of federal government contracts. This led to the setting up of the Budget Monitoring and Price Intelligent Unit (BMPIU known as Due Process) in 2001 to implement the Federal Government's Public Procurement Reform Policy aimed at minimizing open abuses to known rules, processes and standards in the award and execution of public sector contracts in Nigeria.

Following the growing Public demand that the reforms are sustained and institutionalized with legal backing, a Public Procurement Bill was articulated in 2003/2004 by the Leadership of BMPIU and presented to the National Assembly. The Public Procurement Bill was thereafter passed by the National Assembly on the 30th of May, 2007 and subsequently signed into Law by Mr. President on the 4th of June, 2007.

The Public Procurement Act 2007 established the Bureau of Public Procurement as the regulatory authority responsible for the monitoring and oversight of public procurement, harmonizing the existing government policies and practices by regulating, setting

standards and developing the legal framework and professional capacity for public procurement in Nigeria.

The Mandate of the Bureau

The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) is a regulatory body established under the Public Procurement Act, 2007 which came into operation on June 4th 2007 with the signing of the Act into law. The objectives of the Bureau are:

- a. Harmonization of existing government policies and practices on public procurement and ensuring probity, accountability and transparency in the procurement process;
- b. Establishment of pricing standards and benchmarks;
- c. Ensuring the application of fair, competitive, transparent. value-for money standards and practices for the procurement and disposal of public assets and services; and
- d. Ensuring the attainment of transparency, competitiveness, cost effectiveness and professionalism in the public sector procurement system.

The purpose of the Public Procurement Act 2007 is to establish procedures for procurement and disposal of unserviceable, obsolete or surplus store and equipment by public entities in order to achieve the following objectives:

- i. Maximize economy and efficiency;
- ii. That competitors are treated fairly;
- iii. Promote the integrity and fairness of those procedures;
- iv. Increase transparency and accountability in those procedures;
- v. Increase public confidence in those

procedures and

- vi. Facilitate the promotion of local industry and economic development.

Arising from the above, the mandate of the Bureau is to ensure that procurement procedures and regulations are complied with as established under the Public Procurement Act, 2007.

The Functions of the Bureau

The functions of Bureau are set out in Section 5 of the Public Procurement Act 2007. These are to:

- a. Formulate the general policies and guidelines relating to public sector procurement for the approval of the Council;
- b. Publicize and explain the provisions of this Act;
- c. Subject to thresholds as may be set by the Council, certify Federal procurement prior to the award of contract;
- d. Supervise the implementation of established procurement policies;
- e. Monitor the prices of tendered items and keep a national database of standard prices;
- f. Publish the details of major contracts in the procurement journal;
- g. Publish paper and electronic editions of the procurement journal and maintain an archival system for the procurement journal;
- h. Maintain a national database of the particulars and classification and categorization of federal contractors and service providers;
- i. Collate and maintain in an archival system, all federal procurement plans and information;

- j. Undertake procurement research and surveys;
- k. Organize training and development programmes for procurement professionals;
- l. Review, periodically, the socio-economic effect of the policies on procurement and advice the Council accordingly;
- m. Prepare and update standard bidding and contract documents;
- n. Prevent fraudulent and unfair procurement and where necessary apply administrative sanctions;
- o. Review the procurement and award of contract procedures of every entity to which this Act applies;
- p. Perform procurement audits and submit such report to the National Assembly bi-annually;
- q. Introduce, develop, update and maintain related database and technology;
- r. Establish a single internet portal that shall, subject to Section 16 (21) to this Act serve as a primary and definitive source of all information on government procurement containing and displaying all public sector procurement information at all times; and
- s. Co-ordinate relevant training programs to build institutional capacity.

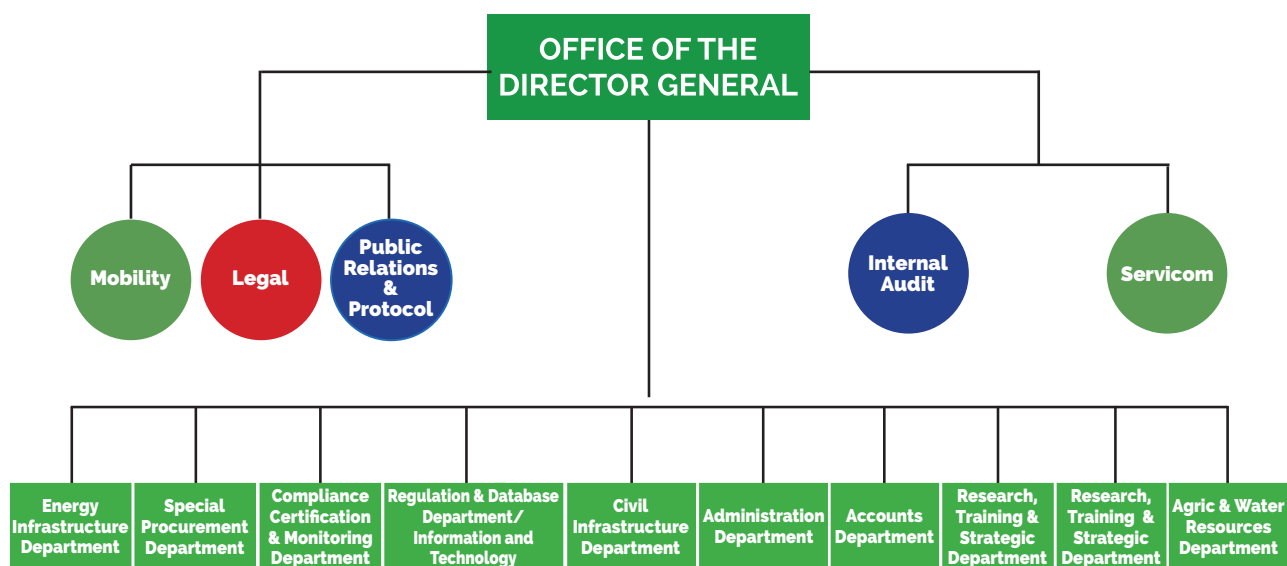

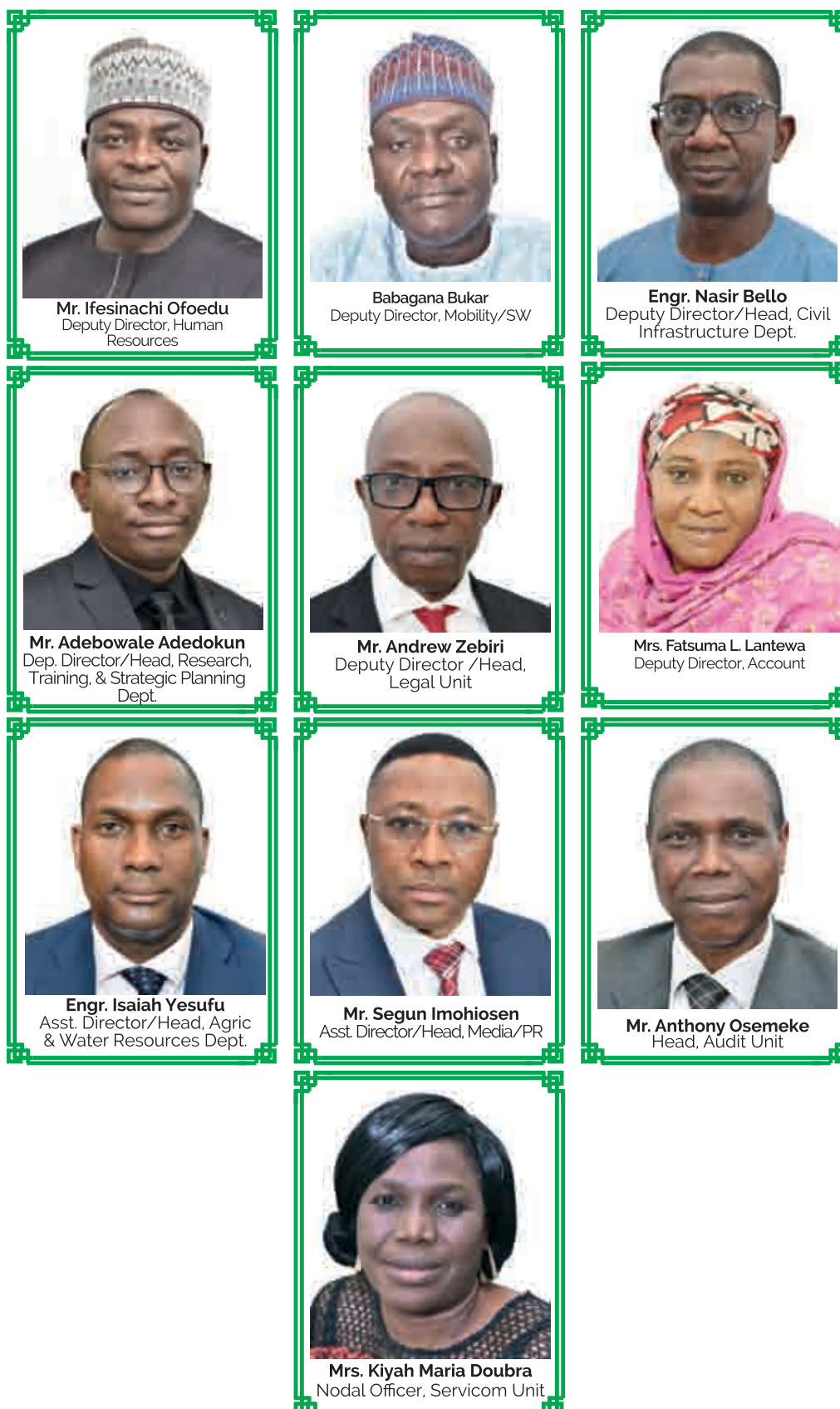

OVERVIEW OF THE PROCUREMENT DEPARTMENT

1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) consist of Five (5) procurement departments also called reviewing departments.
- 1.2 Other departments in the BPP are Database and Regulations/ICT Department, The Research, Training and Strategic Planning (RTSP) Department and the Administration Department, Account & Finance Departments, and Five Units that operates under the Director-General's office.

2.0 The Review departments are:

- ❖ Energy Infrastructure Department
- ❖ Special Procurement Department
- ❖ Compliance, Certification and Monitoring Department
- ❖ Civil Infrastructure Department
- ❖ Agric & Water Resources Department

3.0 The primary responsibilities of the reviewing departments among others are to:

- Treat requests from Ministries Departments and Agencies (MDAs) for issuance of Certificate of "No Objection" and approvals for adopting Restricted/Special Methods of procurement;
- Certify Variation Order Request (VOR) and Revised Estimated Total Cost (RETC) requests from MDAs on some ongoing projects;
- Treat Petitions in collaboration with the other relevant departments;
- Observes Bid openings to ensure compliance to the process in line with the PPA, 2007;
- Carry out procurement audits at the MDAs to ensure compliance with the public procurement Act;
- Review, appraise and strategize the efficient organization of its activities;
- Prepare Memoranda for the exclusive briefing of His, Excellency Mr. President on certain projects and procurement policy matters;

- Monitor the costs of frequently requested items such as vehicles for comparisons between brand types to ensure value for money is derived for such procurements;
- Carried out market survey to verify the cost of frequently reviewed items;
- Perform Procurement Audits at the MDAs to ensure compliance with the Public Procurement, Regulations, issued Circulars and provisions of the Public Procurement Act, 2007;
- Administrative Review of contention procurement processes due to petition or complaints from bidders and other stakeholders as may be required by the Director General;
- Participates in training and development programmes for procurement officers in the MDAs and professionals;
- Vets Draft Due Process Review Reports and Letters for Director-General's consideration;
- Prepares Certificates and Letters of "No Objection" upon approval by the DG;
- Treats Complaints and conducts Right-of-Reply meetings;
- Schedules Procurement Audits at the Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) and collates the Reports for the Director-General's consideration and further actions;
- Conducts Monitoring Exercise on MDAs to ensure compliance with Bureau of Public Procurement's (BPP) directives;
- Schedules Officers to observe Bid Openings at MDAs and communicate Bureau's observations to the MDAs;
- Vets advertisements to ensure compliance with the Public Procurement Act (PPA), 2007;
- Represents the Director-General at official engagements as directed.

The Department holds formal meetings to review and appraise ongoing activities in order to fashion out the best means and methods of improving the status quo for expeditious project delivery.

4.0 Status of Complaints Treated by the Department

- 4.1 During the period under review (January to December, 2020), the Complaints listed in Table 4.1 below were treated with a view to achieving value for money for the Government of the Federal Republic of Nigeria by ensuring compliance with the Public Procurement Act (PPA), 2007.

- Six (6) out of the One Hundred and Forty-Four (144) Complaints are on-going as at the end of the period under review;
- While One Hundred and Thirty-Eight (138) out of the One Hundred and Forty-Four (144) Complaints were treated and closed in line with the provisions of Section 54 of the Public Procurement Act 2007.
- The number of closed Complaints as shown in Table 4.1 above indicates an improved service delivery, which promotes transparency, equity, accountability in conformity with the provisions of the PPA, 2007.

Below is the Chart showing the Analysis of the 138 Closed Complaints

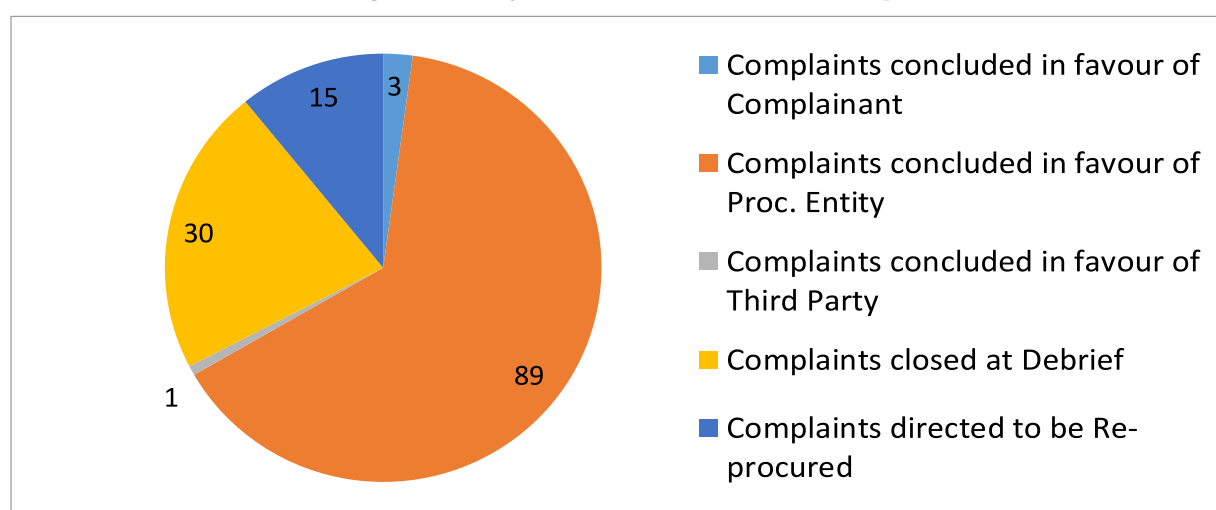

Below is the Chart showing the Analysis of Decisions taken in favour of Procuring Entities

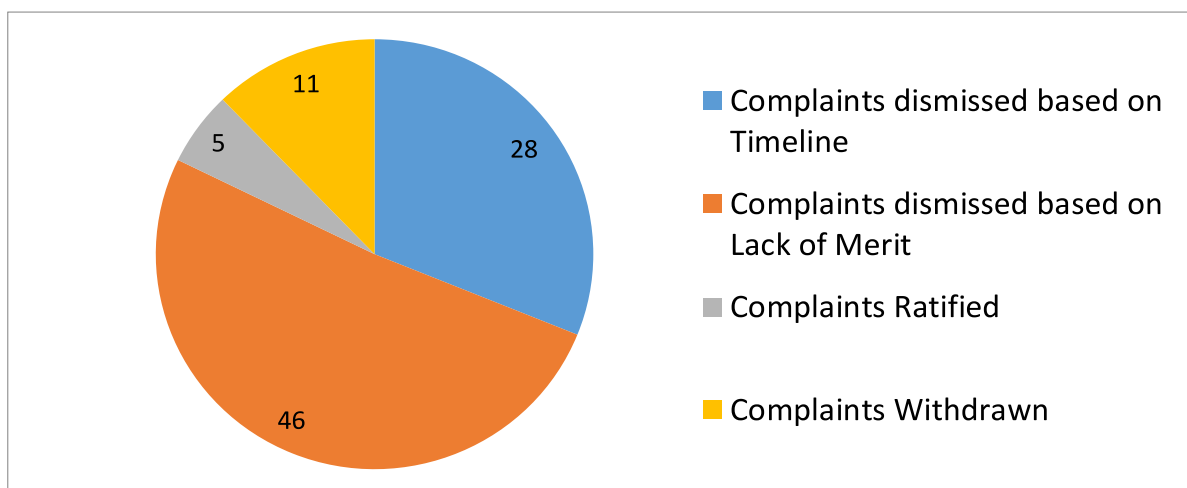
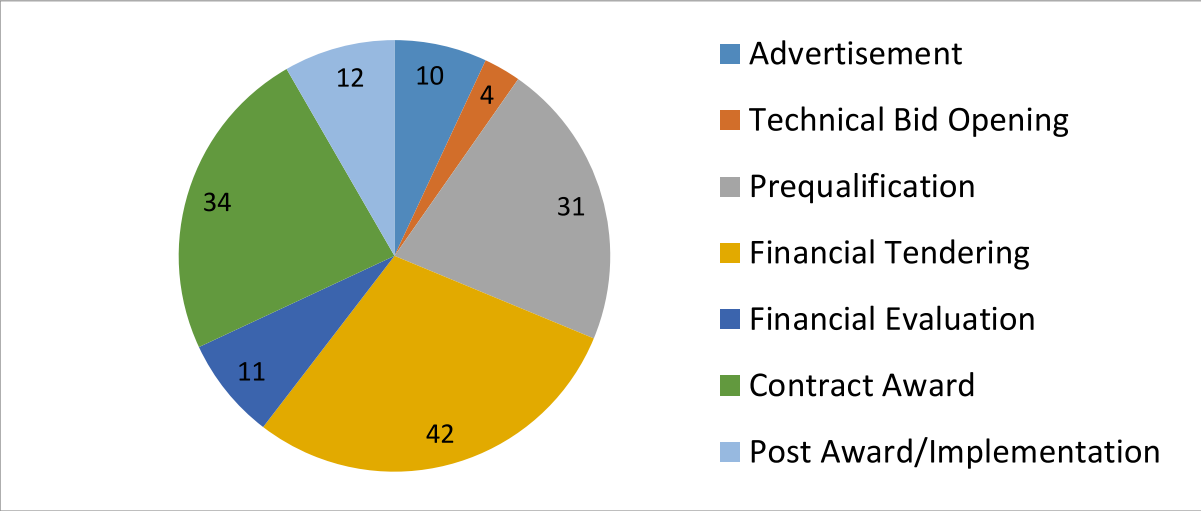

5.0 Right of Reply Meetings (R-o-R)

- 5.1 The Department calls for Right-of-Reply (RoR) Meetings to resolve Complaints received from Bidders/Contractors where the Complainants, other bidders and MDAs are invited to make representations with the intention to resolve Complaints received pursuant to Section 54 of the PPA, 2007.
- 5.2 **Five (5) Right-of-Reply** Meetings were held at the Bureau between January and December, 2020.
- 5.3 A Review Officer reviews a Complaint received from a bidder, and a Review Report is prepared.
- 5.4 Where a Right-Of-Reply Meeting is required, the Heads of Department/Unit are invited to a pre-meeting briefs before the Right-of-Reply Meeting proper to harmonise various thoughts and take a common position for the Right-of-Reply Meeting. Arising from deliberations at Right-of-Reply Meetings, Complaints are either resolved or referred for further investigation with ICPC or EFCC. One (1) No Complaint was referred to ICPC in the period under review.

6.0 Certificates of “No Objection”

6.1 Following substantial compliance with the provisions of the Public Procurement Act, 2007, Public Procurement Regulations and extant Guidelines on public procurement, the Bureau issued **Three Hundred and Fifty-Six (356)** Certificates of “No Objection” to MDAs in the months of January to December, 2020, as shown below:

7.0 Bid Openings

7.1 The Department received Thirty-Four (34) Invitations to attend Bid opening during the period under review but was only able to attend Twenty-Three (23), which recorded substantial compliance to the provisions of the PPA, 2007. The Department was unable to attend the other Eleven (11) bid openings because the invitations were either received after the bid opening had taken place or the MDA is located outside the Federal Capital Territory.

8.0 Review/Vetting of MDAs' Advertisements

8.1 The Bureau identified **Two (2)** defective advertisements placed by the MDAs between January and December, 2020, and directed the affected MDAs to correct the defects in the advertisement in order to fully comply with the provisions of the PPA, 2007. Subsequently, the Bureau received **Two (2)** corrigenda from the MDAs, as evidence of compliance with the Bureau's directives to correct the deficiency as shown below:

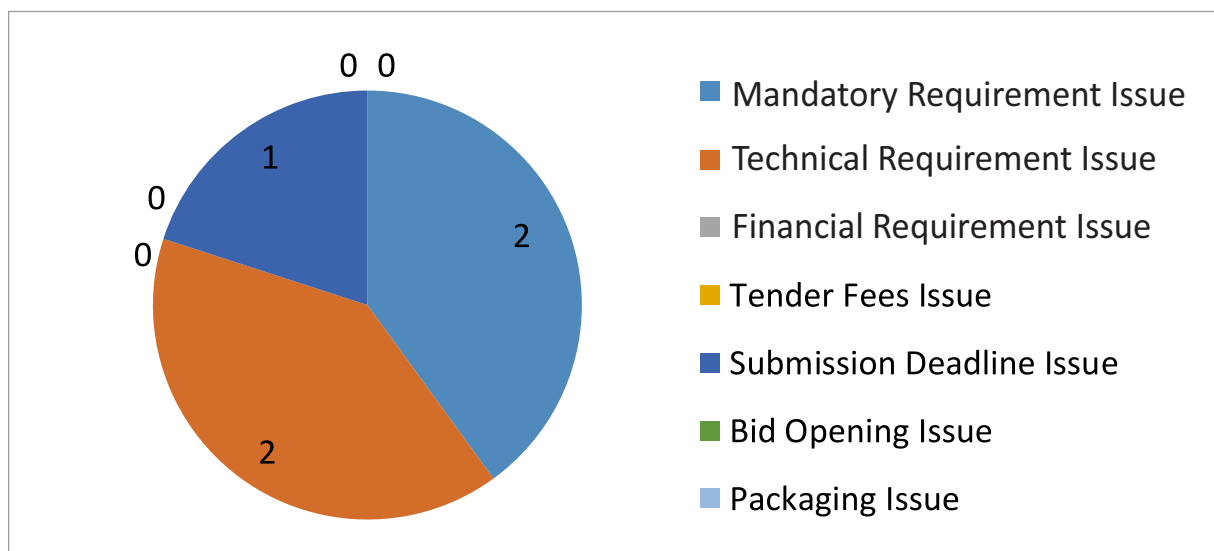

8.3 The drastic reduction in the number of defective advertisement was because of the proactive steps taken by the Bureau in reviewing draft advertisements before publication. This preventive action has drastically reduced number of deficient advertisements to near zero. The Bureau reviewed **Five Hundred and Sixteen (516)** number of draft advertisements before publication in the period under review, which drastically reduced the number of defective advertisement to Two (2), this in turn has saved the Federal Government of Nigeria some costs, as shown below:

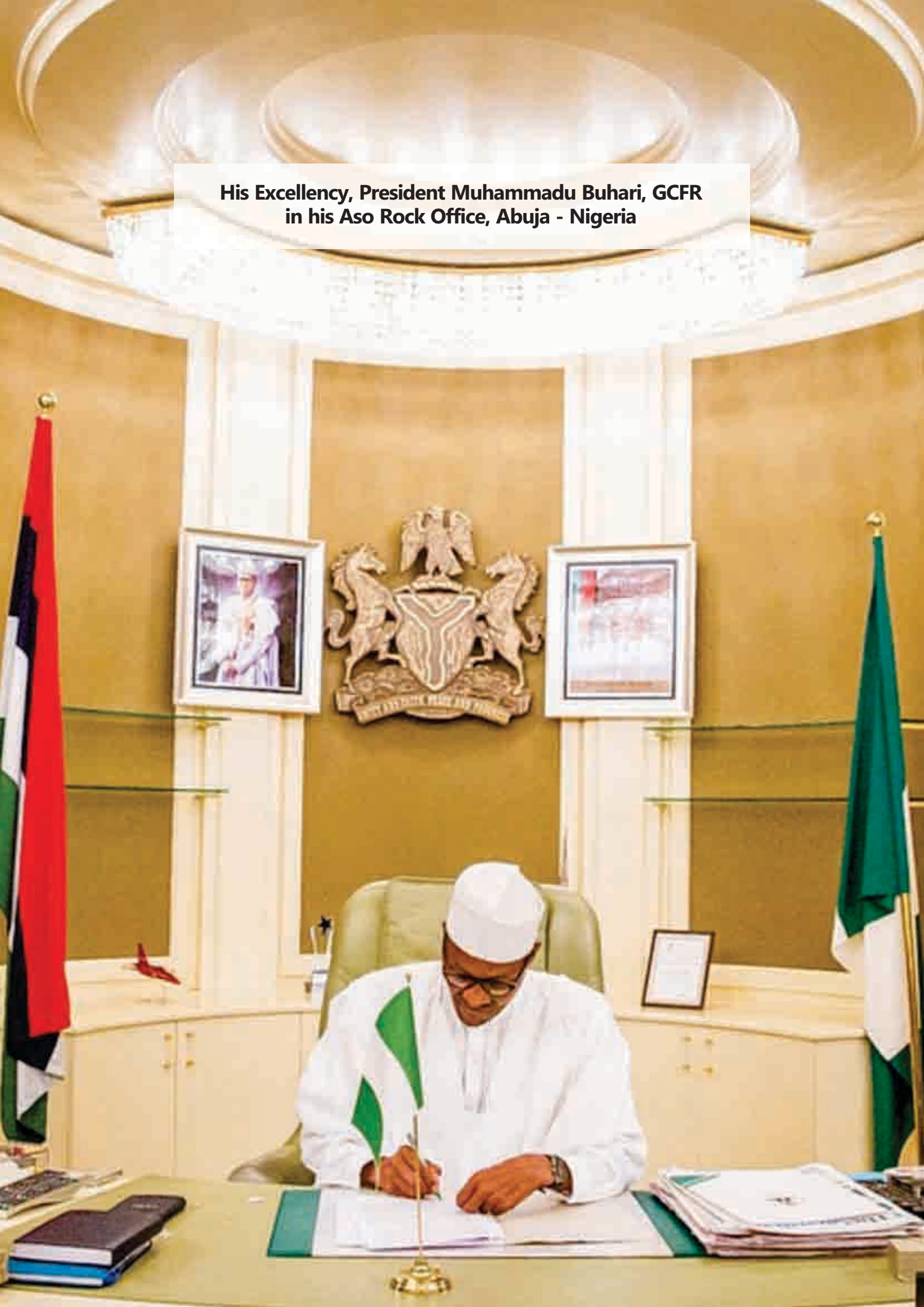
9.0 Challenges facing the Department

- a. The MDAs do not forward procurement documents to the Bureau in time to enable commencement of administrative reviews, this prevents the Department from completing Administrative Review within Twenty-One (21) days stipulated by the PPA, 2007;
 - b. Some MDAs still have knowledge gap in the PPA, 2007 and its extant Guidelines on public procurement, which grossly affect their level of compliance to the Act;
 - c. Furthermore, there is resistance to change on the part of procurement officers, who are often selective of which part of the PPA, 2007, to comply with;
 - d. The Quality of Reports by some Reviewing Officers requires improvement and support;
 - e. The Department's monitoring of procurements in the MDAs is very low due to inadequate manpower.

10.0 Way Forward

- 10.1 In order to ameliorate the challenges facing the Department, the following actions are recommended:
- a. Increase the awareness in MDAs (through forums, conferences, workshops, training, and correspondences) on the need to timely forward to the Bureau all requested documents. Sanctioning of erring MDAs to deter other MDAs from ignoring the Bureau's directives;
 - b. Continuous update of the Research, Training and Strategic Planning Department on the Training needs of the MDAs;
 - c. Develop strategy to establish serious breaches and apply sanction or refer criminal breaches to the relevant investigative Agency for further necessary action;
 - d. Follow up with other Departments to thoroughly review and correct their reports before forwarding to the CCM Department, to reduce the amount of corrections to be carried out on reviews and improve quality of outcome;
 - e. Post more employed staff to the Department to reduce workload and improve efficiency and effectiveness in delivering schedules like Procurement Audit/Monitoring.

Introduction

The Regulation and Database/ICT Department (RDB/ICT) is one of the nine (9) departments in the Bureau. R&DB Department is tasked with the responsibility of contributing to the successful implementation of the functions of the Bureau as stipulated in Section 5 of the Public Procurement Act, 2007. The department has enormous responsibilities which includes Implementation of Executive Order, Open Contracting, E-Procurement and Enterprise, Procurement Management System, Archival System, National Database of the Particulars and Classification and Categorization of Federal Contractors and Service Providers among others.

Nigeria Open Contracting Portal (NOCOPO)

The Nigeria Open Contracting Portal (NOCOPO) is about opening up public procurement in Nigeria through increased disclosure of procurement information to all stakeholders with a view to ensuring improved transparency and competition, prevent corruption, enhance active citizen participation towards achieving better service delivery and improved ease of doing business in Nigeria.

This NOCOPO portal, conceived by the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) in line with Section 59 (R) of the Public Procurement Act, 2007, was co-created with Civil Society Organisations in fulfillment of Commitment 2 of the Nigeria National Action Plan (NAP) of the Open Government Partnership which is "Full implementation of Open Contracting and adoption of Open Contracting Data Standard in the public sector".

The Department give MDA's access to the portal to enable staff of MDA's input data on the portal

1. Creation of users from Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) for access to the NOCOPO. About **2,000** users in over **300** MDAs have been granted access to the Portal, As At December 2020.
2. Resolution of complaints from users of NOCOPO

4. System support - receiving and responding to complaints, feedback and inquiries from users of the CCSP Database;
5. Generation of reports and querying;
6. Trained the Collaborating agencies – CAC, FIRS, PENCOM, ITF and NSITF on how resolve issues pertaining the agencies
7. Served as CCSP Help Desk by providing help in resolving issues and complaints from CCSP Users for the difficulties encountered while using the CCSP Database for Registration.

TRAINING RESEARCH AND STRATEGIC PLANNING

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Department is saddled with the responsibility to cover three main areas of the activities of the Bureau. Those areas of duties cover Research, Training and Strategic Planning and any other assignment that maybe assigned.

2.0 FUNCTIONS

The department has the responsibility to coordinate and deliver on various capacity building programmes on public procurement for all strata of governance at the federal level and in collaboration with states, private sector organizations and Civil Society Organizations(CSOs)/Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs).

3.0 ACTIVITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT

The department undertook the following activities in collaboration with other departments, external resource persons/organizations and the Procuring Entities at both federal and state levels.

4.0 CAPACITY BUILDING INITIATIVES

- **PROCUREMENT RETREAT FOR FEDERAL PERMANENT SECRETARIES:** The 10th Edition of the Annual Public Procurement Retreat for Federal Permanent Secretaries, Accountant-General of the Federation and Auditor-General for the Federation organized by the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) in collaboration with the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation held at the Bristol Palace Hotel, Farm Centre, Kano, Kano State from Friday 7th to Saturday 8th February 2020.

The Retreat with the theme '**Procurement Implementation in the New Budget Cycle**' provided the opportunity to take stock of the progress in Public Procurement Reform and to discuss the actions needed to enhance the process towards the attainment of national goals.

Dignitaries present at the Opening Ceremony included the Executive Governor of Kano State, His Excellency, Dr. Abdullahi Umar Ganduje, OFR, represented by the Secretary to Kano State Government, Alhaji Usman Alhaji; the Hon. Minister of Transportation, Rt. Hon. Rotimi Amaechi, CON, the Chairman, Senate Committee on Public Procurement; Chairman, House Committee on Public Procurement and the Kano State Head of Service, Hajia Binta Lawan Ahmed.

Participants at the Retreat included the Ag. Head of the Civil Service of the Federation, Dr. Folasade Yemi-Esan; Federal Permanent Secretaries; Accountant-General of the Federation, Surveyor-General of the Federation, the Director General, Bureau of Public

Procurement, staff of the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation and the Bureau of Public Procurement, amongst others.

Technical papers presented during the Retreat were: **“Understanding the Public Procurement Process in the new Budget Cycle – what an Accounting Officer must know and do”**, **“Amendments to the Public Procurement Act, 2007”**, **“Scorecard of the Procurement activities of MDAs”**, **“Silent Killer Diseases in Nigeria”**, and **“Presentations on New trends in Public Procurement”**. A discussion session on **“The Role of Honourable Ministers in the Procurement Process”** featured the Honourable Ministers of Transportation, Water Resources, Health and Works & Housing.

- **PROCUREMENT RETREAT FOR CHIEF EXECUTIVES OF FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PARASTATALS/AGENCIES/COMMISSION:** Due to covid-19 pandemic, the retreat was not held.
- **PROCUREMENT CONVERSION/INDUCTION:** The conversion/induction to Procurement Cadre for Parastatals, Agencies and Commissions of the Federal Government was held from March 15- April 4, 2020 at the Digital Bridge Institute (DBI), 1, Nitel Road, Cappa Bus-Stop, Agege Motor Road, Oshodi, Lagos. However, as a result of the outbreak of covid-19 pandemic, the training was suspended and restarted from Sunday, November 8 – Saturday, November 28, 2020.

- **PROCUREMENT TRAININGS CONDUCTED FOR MDAS IN 2020:** The department was able to carry out some In-house trainings for MDAs across the Federation but was limited due covid-19 restrictions on physical meetings.
- **QUARTERLY INTERACTIVE WORKSHOPS WITH PROCUREMENT OFFICERS:** A One-Day Interactive Workshop for Procurement Officers on the Directorate Level was held On Thursday, March 5, 2020 at the State House Auditorium, Abuja.

The Interactive Session provided the participants the opportunity to take stock, introduce new trends in the procurement process, and discuss matters arising in the Procurement Departments and to critically consider issues as observed by the Bureau.

- **REFRESHER (PREPARATORY) TRAINING WORKSHOP FOR PROCUREMENT OFFICERS ON THE DIRECTORATE CADRE (G/L 15-17):** The workshop was held from SEPTEMBER 14-18, 2020. The participants were mainly officers preparing for their

promotional examination in the main pool of the federal civil service as well as the opportunity to take stock, acquaint themselves with new trends in the procurement process, and discuss matters arising in the Procurement Departments and to critically consider issues as observed by the Bureau. Over 50 officers attended the course. Resource persons were mainly Bureau's Directors and other external procurement consultants.

5.0 RESEARCH IN PUBLIC PROCUREMENT: The Bureau has two ongoing research works at different levels of completion. The areas of research covers collaboration with statutory Bodies, Individuals and students from various institutions of higher learning with outside the country. The research activities are listed below:

- i. In collaboration with NISER is an ongoing a research titled the **"ASSESSMENT OF MDAS ADHERENCE TO THE PUBLIC PROCUREMENT ACT, 2007 IN THE PURCHASE OF VEHICLES AND THE EFFECT ON THE AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY"**. The result of the research is being finalized.
- ii. In collaboration with Messrs. Oryx Projects Limited is an ongoing research on the **"IMPACT OF THE CHOICE OF SELECTIVE/RESTRICTIVE TENDERING METHOD OF OVER THE DEFAULT OPEN COMPETITIVE TENDERING METHOD OF PROCUREMENT BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PROCURING ENTITIES"**.

6.0 COLLABORATION WITH STATES GOVERNMENTS ON PUBLIC PROCUREMENT REFORMS: The Bureau during the course began discussions with Kano State Due Process Office, Jigawa State Due Process on providing further technical assistance in the area of capacity building for its officers. Jigawa State has firmly created and deployed the newly trained officers to some ministries after the successful completion of the training sponsored by the World Bank. However, the outbreak of covid-19 slowed further collaboration with other states.

7.0 COLLABORATION WITH THE CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS (CSOS)/NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS (NGOS): The Bureau was unable to conduct a refresher course of the procurement observers and eventual revision of the list of the accredited CSOs/NGOs to observe procurement bid opening due to the covid-19 pandemic.

8.0 SUSTAINABLE SECTOR-BASED PUBLIC PROCUREMENT REFORM, PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND RESEARCHES IN PUBLIC PROCUREMENT IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES:

This is a World Bank sponsored project wherein the Bureau is expected to develop a procurement professional certification scheme, a training strategy and deployment andse of online tools for capacity building and certification in the sustainable procurement, environment and social standards.

The project has so far supported the six (6) Centres of Excellence in the development of Track A-E courses which have been approved by the NUC. The Centres are expected to commence the admission and trainings in the year 2021.

Specifically, the Bureau has put in place the project team, procurement process for the engagement of consultants and goods for the take-off of activities as captured in the work plan. In the coming years the framework for the capacity building strategy and certification scheme is expected to have been concluded for further consideration and implementation.

9.0 REPORTS OF ACTIVITIES AT THE THREE (3) PUBLIC PROCUREMENT RESEARCH CENTRES AT FEDERAL UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY, OWERRI, AHMADU BELLO UNIVERSITY, ABU AND UNIVERSITY OF LAGOS: The Bureau provided two (2) of the Centres - FUTO and ABU with Resource Persons drawn for the Bureau and others from the private sector (retired procurement directors).

- **PUBLIC PROCUREMENT RESEARCH CENTRE (PPRC), FUTO:** The Centre held various workshops for Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) from March to December 2021. The summary of the modules and total number of participants are shown below:

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Finance and Accounts Division serves as an adviser to the Accounting Officer on all financial information and matters. It is also responsible for the processing, recording and documentation of all payments as well as liaising with the Office of the Accountant-General of the Federation (OAGF) and other relevant agencies in relation to financial matters. The Division is headed by a Deputy Director Accounts, who reports directly to the Accounting Officer.

The main activities of the division as stipulated in Financial Regulations (FR 114) 2009 are as follows:

- (i) Ensuring compliance with Financial Regulations and the Accounting code by all staff under his control and supervision;
- (ii) Ensuring adequate supervision of the disbursement of funds and proper monitoring and accounting for revenue;
- (iii) Advising the Accounting Officer on all financial matters as well as the more technical provisions of these Regulations and other Treasury and Finance Circulars;
- (iv) Maintaining proper accounting records such as book of accounts, Main and Subsidiary Ledgers;
- (v) Ensuring prompt rendition of all returns e.g. consolidated Accounts (monthly transcript), Bank reconciliation statement, Revenue and Expenditure returns as prescribe in the Regulations;
- (vi) Compiling and defending of the budget proposal and ensuring effective budgeting control by matching/comparing budget figures with actual expenditure or revenue as the case may be and advice the Accounting Officer appropriately;
- (vii) Ensuring that all staff under his control are expose to regular training programmes to prepare them for the efficient performance of their duties;

- (ix) Liaising with the Accountant-General from time to time when in doubt in the interpretations of the provision of these Regulations and other Treasury Circulars or when confronted with difficulties in the performance of his duties;
- (x) Ensuring the existence of an effective Audit Query Unit/Section to promptly deal with all queries from Internal Audit Unit, Inspectorate Department, Office of the Accountant-General, Office of the Auditor-General and the Public Account Committee; and
- (xi) Maintaining/keeping of all books of accounts



The Federal Executive Council has approved the review to the 2020 budget and the Medium Term Expenditure Framework for 2020-2022 as recommended by the ministry of finance.

1.2 **SENIOR STAFF COMMITTEE MEETING**

Following the successful deliberation of the Senior Staff Committee, they took into consideration some issues of Salary Steps, Salary Grade Level placements and Conversion complaints from members of staff, subsequently granted ratification for all adjustments.

2.0 STORE UNIT

The store unit under the management services of the Bureau has the following mandates:

- To authorize the quantity of item due to staff.
- To sign the SRV, whenever there is a supply.
- To ensure update of stores' books.
- Issuing of items to user department.
- Updating the stores' market survey list.
- Raising requisition as required.
- To take physical inventory of stock.
- Stocktaking and storekeeping.
- To ensure that the store is secured.

- 2.1 The store unit significantly executed her activities through the supervisory department, Finance & Management Services; the department had been instrumental to our service delivery. The store unit collectively discharged its responsibilities with the excellent work ethics stipulated on its work rules, by ensuring the receipt of best quality materials or items and issued to user departments when needed.
- 2.2 The unit ensuring that there were materials available for the two scheduled conversion exercises in year, sensitization programmes, workshops, and other activities within and outside the Bureau.
- 2.3 Furthermore, the unit carried out inventory of the items on quarterly basis. Both the internal and external Auditors monitored the check and balances of the Bin cards and Ledgers. The scheduled officer carried out frequent supervision of available store items, effectively. The list of unserviceable items where generated by the officers in the unit.
- 2.4 Implied in our work schedule is the need to ensure materials are available at the right time ahead of the request of user department, which we maintained. Notwithstanding the lack of space, the storehouse accentuates the decorum required.

3.0 TRANSPORT UNIT

There are, currently twenty- eight vehicles which includes; eight Toyota Hilux, three Peugeot 301, four Hiace Buses, one Nissan jeep, one Peugeot 408, one Peugeot 508, two Innoson Pickup, two Nissan Pickup, and one Innoson IVM Saloon. One Mitsubishi Pajero, one Toyota Land Cruiser, two Kia and one Toyota Corolla. The Transport Unit has 14 drivers including two dispatch riders.

3.1 Maintenance of vehicles

There have been general maintenance, Servicing and repair of vehicles at when due.

3.2 Replenishment of Total Fuel Cards

The replenishment of cards was carried out in October and December 2020.

3.3 Vehicle Insurance

Vehicles were not insured due to Covid 19 lock down.

3.4 Non- accidental Bonus for Drivers

Non- accidental bonus as stated in the BPP Conditions of Services was paid fourteen drivers including two dispatch riders.

5.0 REGISTRY UNIT

The registry is the nerve centre of any Ministry/Department. No Ministry/Department can function effectively unless the registry is functioning efficiently. The Bureau Registry is more Cumbersome because of its activities with all Ministries, Department and Agencies (MDAs).

Year 2020 has been quite eventful for the Registry unit, records are better organised and located, therefore making them quickly retrievable, thereby facilitating ease of reference, eradicating staff frustrations and increasing productivity.

The existence of documented policies means that staff members execute actions relative to records in a consistent manner, staff members have ready access to all necessary records, and they are able to make decisions with reference to precedent, context and eventualities.

Following the adoption of digital archiving which resulted to the overhauling of the Registry Unit in 2019, the staff of the Registry experienced a seamless workflow in 2020.

The key principles of the Registry being the life wire of the office, is to observe an efficient service delivery as well as overall quality performance in the discharge of duties.

The Registry was open to work at the peak of the pandemic till date.

6.0 SECURITY

- 6.1 The Bureau currently have 12 personnel of the Nigerian Security and Civil Defence Corps, whose job is to ensure the security and orderliness of the office premises.



MOBILITY DIVISION

The activities undertaken by the Mobility Division for the year 2020 are highlighted as follows: During the year under review, the unit supervised the 2020 Promotion Examination for Procurement Officers on the Directorate Cadre; in collaboration with the Federal Civil Service Commission at the Public Service Institute of Nigeria (PSIN). Similarly, the Division organised the Senior Staff Committee (SSC) meeting on the Promotion Examination for Officers on SGL 08-13 (Service-Wide), which took place at the Public Service Institute of Nigeria (PSIN) and conveyed the recommendations to the Federal Civil Service Commission.

FUNCTIONS OF THE MOBILITY DIVISION

1. Managing the career progression of procurement officers in the pool of the Bureau
2. Posting of procurement officers to Ministries, Departments and Agencies
3. Keeping up to date record of procurements officers in the pool
4. Requesting for waivers to fill in the gap of procurement officers in the MPA
5. Discipline of erring procurement officers through the Senior Staff Committee
6. Liaise with the FCSC and OHCSF on any matter that concerns procurement officers in the pool.

During the year under review, the Division attended the 2020 training/workshop on Manpower Planning and Budgeting, a yearly event which took place in Abakaliki, Ebonyi State.

The Division was at the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation (OHCSF) to defend the 2020 Manpower Budget for both Officers of the Bureau and all officers in the pool of the Bureau.

The Division also visited the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation (OHCSF) to defend the 2020 vacancies return for Procurement Officers, in preparation for 2020 Promotion examinations.

The Division in conjunction with the Research & Training Department worked out the modalities for the verification exercise for Procurement Officers in the Parastatals and Agencies only, these were the officers nominated for conversion by their Agencies into the Procurement Cadre. The verification was meant to prevent the use of non-procurement officers in carrying out procurement functions by these agencies.

LEGAL UNIT

INTRODUCTION

The Legal unit is a specialized Unit working jointly with the rest of the departments in order to achieve the objectives of the Bureau in ensuring conformity and strict compliance with the Public Procurement Act, 2007 and other regulations.

The Legal Unit is made up of 6 (six) Lawyers who provide legal services to the Bureau.

The schedule of duties of the unit include, but not limited to: Legal opinions, drafting of contract Agreements, Litigations, liaising with EFCC/ICPC in respect of request for investigations, treating of petitions jointly with the CCM department, vetting of letters from other departments by the Legal Adviser and treating of FOI requests and other assigned duties jointly with other departments.

CONCLUDED CASES

Out of the 13 cases instituted against the Bureau in 2020, only one (1), Cenitio Limited V. BPP has been concluded and judgement entered in favour of the Bureau.

FOI REQUESTS

In the Year 2020, the Bureau received 5 requests on freedom of information and responded accordingly. Please, find attached FOI report of the Bureau of Public Procurement 2020.

NUMBER AND STATUS OF COURT CASES

The Bureau had 13 (thirteen) suits instituted against it in 2020. The Bureau's lawyers are handling these suits in-house.

CONCLUSION

The Legal Unit was able to accomplished all the tasks assigned to it in the Year 2020 due to support and cordial working relationships among the Staff which in one way or the other helped in delivering the mission and objectives of the Bureau.

INTERNAL AUDIT

1.0. Introduction

The internal audit unit of the Bureau of Public Procurement is comprised of two audit staff who are directly responsible to the Accounting Officer for a complete audit of the Agency's financial activities.

The Unit is charged with the functions of measuring and evaluating the effectiveness of all the internal control systems in the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP), while also ensuring transparency and accountability.

The conduct of measuring and evaluating the effectiveness of all the internal control systems are facilitated by the audit staff in the Internal Audit Unit. These officers' activities, duties and functions are recognized in the Financial Regulations and relevant Treasury Circulars. The Internal Control Systems have its basis enshrined in the Financial Regulations chapter 1703, which states:

“The Internal Auditor in charge will be directly responsible to the Accounting Officer for a detailed audit of the accounts and records and for the examination of the systems and procedures in force. Initially he will submit to the Accounting Officer a detailed programme of audit and thereafter he will report monthly to the Accounting Officer on the progress of the Audit. He will also issue special reports, if necessary, when, in his opinion, the attention of the Accounting Officer and of the Accountant-in-charge must be called to any irregularity in the accounting records, or to an apparent weakness in the accounting procedure, or to any apparent in-attention to the reports of the Auditor-General, or to earlier internal audit report(s) issued by him”.

This shall also be enhanced by and other controls established by Management through extant regulations for the purpose of providing a complete and continuous audit of the accounts and records of revenue and expenditure, assets, allocated stores and unallocated stores in the Bureau Of Public Procurement.

2.0. Duties/Functions of Internal Audit Unit:

The following are the duties/functions of internal Audit Unit:

- Undertake comprehensive pre-auditing of all payments and receipts vouchers;
- Ascertain that the system of internal control operates to ensure that the assets are properly controlled and safeguarded from losses arising from fraud, irregularity or corruption;

- Ascertain that there are adequate controls to ensure reliability of accounting and other information as a basis for producing accounts and other financial returns;
- Ascertain that there is an adequate internal control system to ensure the integrity and reliability of financial and other information provided to the Accounting Officer;
- Confirm compliance with laws, regulations and Government Guidelines guiding expenditure of Public Funds.
- Ensure transparency, probity and accountability in the government expenditure process by liaising with the management; and,
- Prepare periodic Reports on monthly, quarterly, half-yearly, yearly and other report that would be required from time to time.
- Ascertain the extent to which the system of internal control ensures compliance with the Financial Rules, Regulations and extant Treasury Circulars, policies and procedures;
- Ascertain that the system of internal control promotes the efficient and effective use of resources in the Bureau of Public Procurement Headquarters.

3.0. Achievements under Internal Audit Unit

- 3.1.0. Internal Audit Unit through its collective and collaborative efforts with that of the management staff were able to achieve the followings:
 - 3.1.0.1. Timely Pre-payment Audit of all payment vouchers.
 - 3.1.0.2. Auditing of stores and ensure the update of stores records.
 - 3.1.0.3. Complete and continuous Audit of Accounts book/Records.
 - 3.1.0.4. Ensure the adequacy of internal control system in place
 - 3.1.0.5. Ensuring the preparation of monthly Audit Reports.
 - 3.1.0.6. Auditing of transport operating system and ensuring that the department records of safes and keys and the duplicates are well kept.
 - 3.1.0.7. Advise the management on the appropriateness of adhering to the Appropriation Act in spending Government funds.

GUIDELINE FOR PUBLICATION OF ADVERTISEMENT IN THE FEDERAL TENDERS JOURNAL AND NATIONAL DAILIES

The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) has observed from series of publications for the solicitation of bids in the Federal Tenders Journal and National Dailies that most Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of Federal Government exhibit poor compliance with the standard requirements for the solicitation of bids as stipulated in section 16(6) of the Public Procurement Act, 2007 and SGF Circulars on compliance with the provisions of ITF and registration on the National Database of Contractors, Consultants and Service Providers.

2. The exhibition of poor compliance with the standard requirements in bid solicitations reviewed by the BPP has resulted in frequent corrections by the Bureau of Public Procurement resulting in Government incurring extra expenditure due to placement of addenda in the same media where the advertisements were initially placed. This trend also affects the Standard Processing Time of procurement in the MDAs resulting in project delay and non-achievement of the desired dividend of democracy to the electorates.

3. Consequently, the Bureau has developed standard advertisement templates for different forms of procurement notices as herewith attached. The soft copy of the standard advertisement templates can also be downloaded from the Bureau of Public Procurement's website on www.bpp.gov.ng.

4. Furthermore, all MDAs are required to ensure that all advertisements for the solicitation of bids are submitted in the required format to the Editorial Board (comprising of BPP staff amongst others) of the Federal Tenders Journal latest by 12noon of Wednesday preceding the Monday bi-weekly publication date of the Federal Tenders.

Journal to allow sufficient time for the Board to vet, clear and communicate the corrected version back to the MDAs for update and publication of the harmonised version in all the media to be published.

4. Any advertisement that does not meet the mandatory requirements and deadline for publication will only be published in subsequent edition of the Federal Tenders Journal and will have its submission deadline extended to comply with the timeline stipulated in the Public Procurement Act, 2007 and extant Public Procurement Regulations.

5. Please ensure strict compliance with the contents of this circular effective immediately.

**COMPLIANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THE PUBLIC PROCUREMENT
ACT (PPA) 2007, AS THEY RELATE TO MAINTAINING A NATIONAL
DATABASE OF ALL CONTRACTORS, CONSULTANTS AND
SERVICE PROVIDERS**

This is to inform all Ministries, Departments and Agencies that Mr. President has directed that any Federal Contractor, Consultant and/or Service Provider that is not registered with the National Database of Federal Contractors, Consultants and Service Providers domiciled at the Bureau of Public Procurement will no longer be allowed to do business with the Government. This is to facilitate the maintenance of a National Database of the particulars, classification and categorization of Federal Contractors, Consultants and Service Providers as required by the provisions of Sections 5(h) and 6(1)(f) of the Public Procurement Act, 2007.

2. Accordingly, all Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of Federal Government are required to ensure that all Contractors, Consultants

and Service Providers doing business with Federal Government are duly registered on the National Database of Federal Contractors, Consultants and Service Providers which can be accessed via the database website at www.federalcontractors.bpp.ng or through the Bureau of Public Procurement's website at www.bpp.gov.ng.

3. Consequently and for the avoidance of doubt, all MDAs should henceforth include "Evidence of registration on the National Database of Contractors, Consultants and Service Providers" as a requirement in solicitations documents in compliance with the provision of Sections 5(h) and 6(1)(f) of the Public Procurement Act, 2007. Prospective bidders should be requested to submit an Interim Registration Report (IRR) as evidence of compliance with this requirement.
4. The implementation of this Circular is with immediate effect and should be brought to the attention of all concerned.
5. Please ensure strict compliance with the contents of this circular.

**PROHIBITION OF OFFICERS ON OTHER CADRES FROM
PROCUREMENT FUNCTIONS WHERE CAREER PROCUREMENT
OFFICERS ARE AVAILABLE**

It will be recalled that since the establishment of the Procurement Officer Cadre and Procurement Department in all Federal Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) vide Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation (OHCSF) Circulars Ref. Nos. HCSF/685/1/24, HCSF/PSO/155/1/3 and HCSF/PSO/155/1/25 of 4th February, 2005, 31st March, 2008 and 9th June, 2008 respectively, the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) has been conducting intensive training and certification programme to convert Officers into the Procurement Officer Cadre.

2. It has, however, come to the attention of Government that after approval by Accounting Officers for their staff to undergo the conversion training programme organised by the BPP, some of these Officers are still not converted from their previous cadre by the Heads of their MDAs after successfully passing the examination and in some instances those that are

eventually converted are not posted to the Procurement Department/Unit to function as Procurement Officers.

3. — It is equally worrisome to Government that staff from other Cadres are posted to Procurement Departments/Units to replace Procurement Officers and to carry out procurement functions in violation of Public Service Rule (PSR) 020506(ii), which prohibits the posting of Officers outside their professional cadres.

4. Consequently, it has been observed with dismay that, the use of unqualified and untrained personnel to conduct procurement functions is one of the major factors that has contributed to the inability of several MDAs to effectively comply with the Public Procurement Act, 2007 when implementing their projects. Such procedural lapses have resulted in avoidable petitions by bidders which delay procurement proceedings, increase procurement-related court cases and contribute to poor budget implementation. This will no longer be tolerated by Government.

5. To this end, all Accounting Officers are hereby directed to ensure that, henceforth:

- (i) only Officers employed as Procurement Officers or converted to the Procurement Officer cadre are permitted to conduct procurement functions;
- (ii) Officers employed directly as Procurement Officers are made to undergo a compulsory Induction Procurement Training Programme organized by the Bureau;
- (iii) officers who pass the conversion examination organised by the BPP should immediately be converted into the Procurement Officer Cadre by the respective Senior Staff Committee;
- (iv) conversion into the Procurement Officer Cadre which is a lateral conversion should not result in loss of grade level for any reason;

- (v) Officers on other Cadres should no longer be posted or transferred to the Procurement Department/Unit and assigned procurement functions particularly when career Procurement Officers have been employed by, or posted to, such MDAs;
 - (vi) MDAs without qualified Procurement Officers should as a matter of urgency liaise with the BPP to conduct procurement training for staff handling procurement functions and ensure that such staff are compulsorily enrolled for the next conversion and or induction exercise scheduled by the BPP;
 - (vii) staff proposed by MDAs for conversion into the Procurement Officer Cadre should possess qualification in the relevant disciplines approved by the National Council on Establishment and conveyed vide HCSF Circular Ref No HCSF/685/I/24 of 4th February, 2005; and
 - (viii) where staff handling procurement functions do not possess the requisite academic qualifications for conversion to the Procurement Officer Cadre, the BPP should post Procurement Officers to fill the gap in such MDAs pending when suitably qualified staff will be recruited by the affected MDAs.
6. The implementation of this Circular is with immediate effect and the content should be brought to the attention of all Accounting Officers for strict compliance.

**CONDUCT OF POST-QUALIFICATION/DUE DILIGENCE ON
RECOMMENDED BIDDERS FOR CONSIDERATION
FOR AWARD OF CONTRACT**

It has been observed that Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) are not complying with the provisions of Sections 23(10) and 32(3)(i) of the Public Procurement Act (PPA), 2007, which were reiterated in Clauses 40.9 and 40.10 of the Procurement Procedure Manual and Clauses 107 of the Public Procurement Regulations for Goods and Works mandating procuring entities to verify the information submitted by recommended bidders before contract award.

2. As a result, the Federal Executive Council (FEC) in its Meeting of Wednesday, 17th May, 2017 reached a resolution that detailed Due Diligence/Post-Qualification must be carried out on recommended Contractors to confirm their technical and financial integrity to successfully execute projects before committing Government's scarce resources.

3. To this end, all Accounting Officers are to ensure that post-qualification/due diligence are carried out on all bidders recommended for award of projects and the report of such verification should form part of the documents to be submitted to the Bureau when requesting for Due

Process Certificate of "No Objection". The Due Diligence Report should include the detailed findings on the following:

- i. Names of the Directors of the Company;
- ii. Professional and technical qualifications of personnel submitted to carry out the procurement;
- iii. Financial capacity of the Company;
- iv. Equipment and other relevant infrastructure possessed;
- v. Verification of adequate personnel to perform the obligations of the procurement contract;
- vi. Possesses the legal capacity to enter into contract with the Federal Government;
- vii. Not in receivership, subject of any form of insolvency or bankruptcy proceedings or the subject of any form of winding up petition or proceedings;
- viii. Have fulfilled all the obligation with regards to payments of taxes, pensions and social security contributions; and
- ix. Not have any Director who has been convicted in any Country for criminal offences relating to fraud or financial impropriety or criminal misrepresentation or falsification of facts relating to any matter.

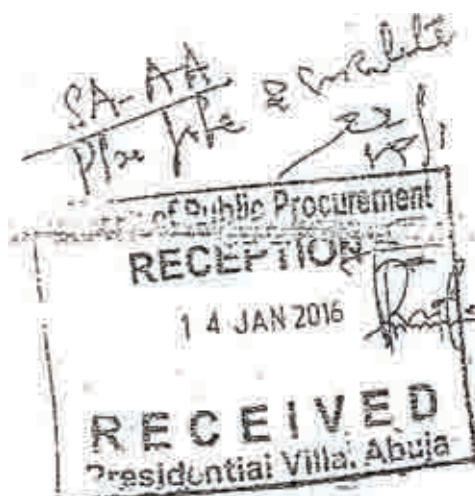
4. MDAs should therefore note that the Bureau of Public Procurement would not consider any request for Due Process Certificate of "No Objection" that is not accompanied with Due Diligence Report duly approved by the Accounting Officer of procuring entity. Thus, MDAs should adhere strictly to this directive.

5. The Implementation of this Circular is with immediate effect and the content should be brought to the attention of all concerned for strict compliance.

APPROVED POLICY FOR PROCUREMENT OF HEALTH AND MEDICAL EQUIPMENT/LIST OF MANUFACTURERS AND EQUIPMENT FOR TERTIARY HOSPITALS

INTRODUCTION

Health and Medical Equipment are essential and indispensable components in the provision of modern Healthcare Services by facilitating good standard treatment of patients as well as creating enabling conditions that motivate Medical personnel to higher competence. The attention of the Federal Government have however been drawn to the unwholesome practices going on within the entire Health Sector with respect to the Procurement of these Health and Medical Equipment, As a result, most Healthcare Institutions nationwide are currently full of various types of dysfunctional and obsolete Health and Medical Equipment and Plants procured from different sources and countries, often without regard to their standards, the desired needs and safety considerations during their operation. In order to correct this dangerous drift, there is the compelling need for the revision of the existing policy for procurement of Health and Medical Equipment.

2. Consequently, Mr. President, C-in-C directed the Bureau of Public Procurement to liaise and collaborate with the Federal Ministry of Health, Standards Organization of Nigeria (SON) and the Nigerian Nuclear Regulatory Authority (NNRA) to develop policy options that would focus on Standards of Medical Equipment to be used in Nigeria.
3. After series of Consultative meetings of the Stakeholders, the Report of the recommended Policy Options for the Procurement of Health and Medical Equipment for Nigeria was articulated and was graciously approved by Mr. President for immediate implementation.
4. The Federal Government anticipates that the vigorous and consistent implementation of this Policy, through the concerted efforts of all practitioners, will stem the prevailing drawbacks, ensure value for money, substantially improve the quality of Healthcare, enhance the standardization of Medical Equipment and discourage the dumping of obsolete and derelict Medical Equipment in the country amongst others.

APPROVED POLICY

The approved Policy are:-

- a) The policy shall be applicable to all Health and Medical Equipment including donated ones;
- b) International Standards are to be adopted for Medical products, measuring Devices and Instruments, which currently are not covered by Standards issued by the SON, but subject to confirmation by SON, any Testing body or Certification body accredited by SON (TUV-Certification for Germany, Intertek, and Lloyds Register of Quality for UK amongst others). In the absence of Nigerian or International Standard, the Analysis Certificate accompanying the product shall be used;
- c) The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) shall publish Biennial, the updated list of Manufacturers/Suppliers that demonstrate compliance with preferred and fundamental standards, who can be selected for the procurement of their Medical Devices;
- d) The Manufacturer/Supplier shall have a Service Centre or Service Agent resident in Nigeria and shall be fully represented directly or through a trained and reputable local representative;
- e) Selection of Health and Medical Equipment to be procured shall be based on the guidelines in the generic list proposed by World Health Organization (WHO) and their specific functionality regarding the disease pattern in the country and having competent professional for management of the Equipment;
- f) All Health and Medical Equipment shall be registered with SON subject to meeting registration requirements such as:-
 - i. offshore Standards Organization of Nigeria Conformity Assessment Programme (SONCAP) Certification;
 - ii. Evidence. of ISO 13485 Quality Management System Certification by a recognized Certification body;
 - iii. Approval Certificate given by the Federal Ministry of Health or NAFDAC or Nigerian Nuclear Regulatory Authority (NNRA) for all medical devices and equipment with radiation sources;

- iv. Guaranty Certificate in English Language Evidence of demonstrable and appropriate competency for the servicing/repair of Equipment in a Service Centre in Nigeria and for the training of personnel of the appropriate users in operations and management of the Equipment including the validity period of qualification
 - v. Assurance that Medical Devices powered by electricity are rated on 220-240V, in addition to applicable safety regulations
- g) The point of importation of Health and Medical Equipment into Nigeria shall be restricted to all International Airports and Seaports;
- h) Procurement and tender Notices shall give comprehensive information such as size, capacity, necessary spares parts and accessories, temperature requirements of the Equipment and also the available Electrical and Water supplies where applicable; the location for Delivery and Installation of Equipment and the Training required by the users to manage and maintain the Equipment after Installation and Commissioning.

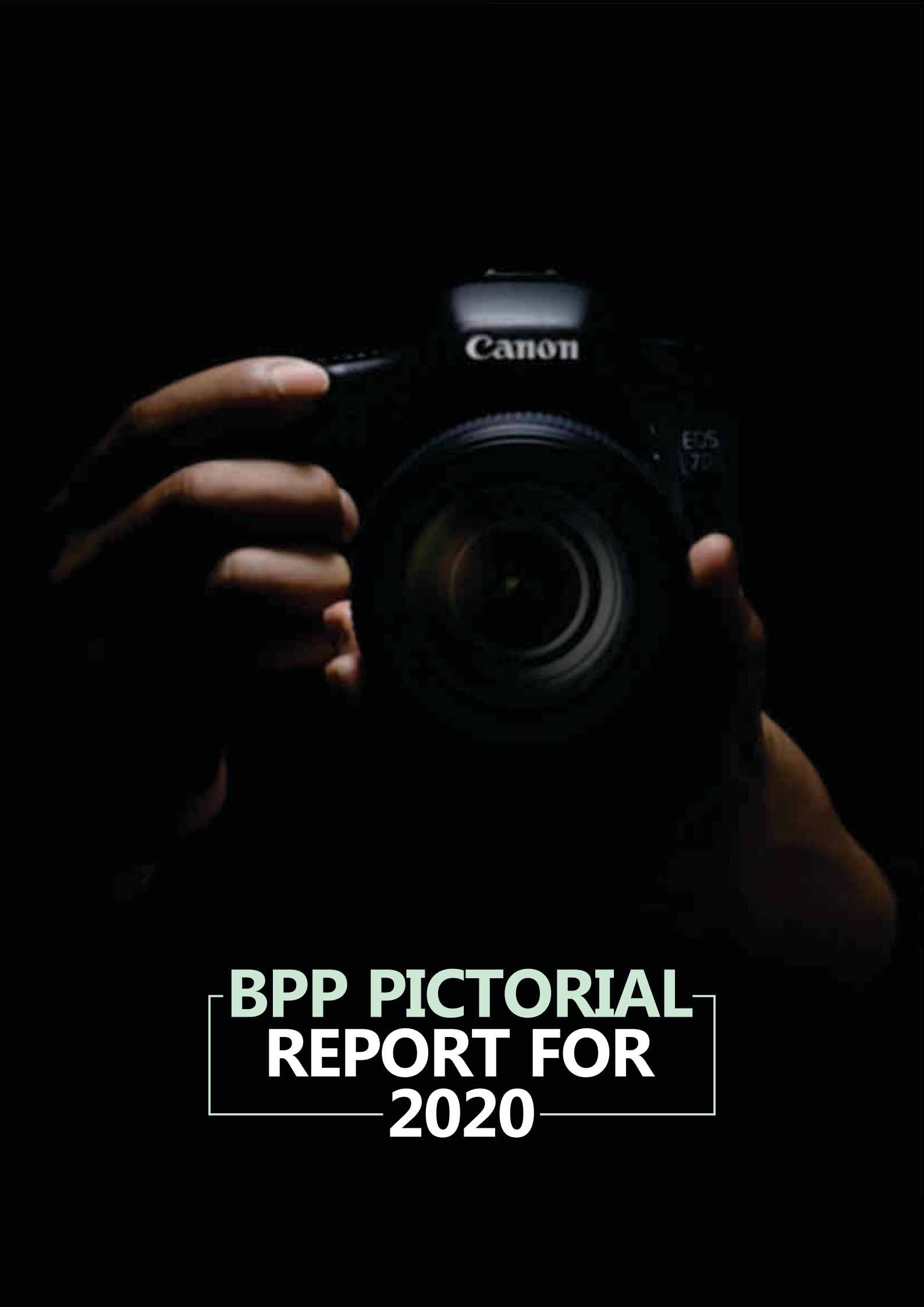
